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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Portfolio Class will serve as the capstone course in the major and reinforce key New Media concepts. Students will develop a final professional portfolio to display their command of multimedia design. Students will be able to utilize this portfolio in an interview in order to obtain work in the field of New Media. The portfolio will serve as a final thesis project and contain revised examples of their past work.

READINGS

Reading handouts will be given via the website listed above. All readings must be printed to be read, underlined, notated and brought to class to help you participate in discussions. • Overdue assignments will be graded down one grade each week it is late.
